Brethren Values in a Non-Brethren World

If your experience is similar to mine, you have probably encountered the question: "What does it mean to be Brethren?" And if you are like me, you may not know how to answer that guestion. There are to many possible answers. Some would say that being Brethren means that we are a Peace Church. Others would say that being Brethren means that we are a New Testament Church. Some would say that it means we are a church committed to a wide diversity of theologies united together for the common good of serving Christ by serving the world. And still others would say that we are not much different than any other Church, we love Jesus, we love the Bible, we love all people and we are committed to sharing Jesus love with the world.

I suppose my favorite "pat answer" is this: "we are sort of like progressive Amish." Of course, that answer just leads to more confusion, but it is a springboard for me to fill in the bigger picture. So let me describe how I believe all the above answers to be true. These are in no particular order of importance: New Testament Church. Our concept "New Testament Church" started with the idea that our creed is the (entire) New Testament. It was felt by early Brethren that creeds limited what one should believe to be Christian. For example, "turning the other cheek" is as important as Baptism. The New Testament because is a New Covenant. Because the Old Testament's support of

war is inconsistent with Jesus' teachings, we limit our creed to the New Testament.

Peace Church. The Church of the Brethren, along with the Quakers and the Mennonites eschew war in all forms. Because Jesus commanded us to "turn the other cheek," we hold that we do not want to be involved in human warfare. We believe that we belong to Kingdom of God before the kingdoms of mankind. But, we offer no force in religion. Many Brethren serve with clear conscience in the military. Many of us believe that God has given governments the responsibility of a "just defense." And so, we honor our government's duty, but many do not participate themselves. During WWII we served as Chaplains, medics, drivers, and some of us even volunteered to be emaciated in order to help physicians learn how to treat survivors of death camps.

Diverse Church. This springs from the doctrine "no force in religion." We are committed to the belief that the Holy Spirit leads and guides people according to God's desire and plan for their life. It is not our place to mandate what a person has to believe. We are committed to unity because we believe that people on all sides of the spectrum can work together to bring Jesus' love to our world. LOVE FUND UPDATE

The Love Fund exists as a quickly accessed resource to help those in need. A number of people call for assistance and are screened by the pastor, secretary, and/or deacons. They must meet




the criteria set by the deacons, but help is usually in the form of a voucher for the Community Harvest Food Bank or a Walmart card. The voucher gets them 100 pounds of food for which we are charged \$19. The Walmart card can be used for fuel or products not covered by the food bank. Whether we are in a visible location, first in the alphabet, the economy is such that more people need help, or word has spread that Agape is a good resource - our Love Fund has been extremely active in the past few months.

We appreciate those who donate through offerings and/or in the quarter bank. As of July 23 we have \$484 in the Love Fund. Since January I we have given 58 vouchers for Community Harvest Food Bank, given out 40 Walmart cards, and assisted 3 families with rent or utilities. This is quite an outreach for our church, and we hope you continue to freely give to support this ministry of Agape.
