## Attending to Our Relationship with God

One of the challenges we face as Christians is maintaining a vital relationship with our Lord. All of the pressures of life don't suddenly fall away after our baptism and commitment to Christ. We can repeatedly be distracted in life by the various pressures and everyday challenges that confront us, and we can sadly lose our focus on the quest of knowing God more and more. What follows then is often dissatisfaction, confusion and discouragement. It is imperative that we repeatedly seek to regain our focus on the Lord, when we realize it has turned elsewhere.

Nourishing a relationship with anyone takes time and sacrifice. You must say "no" to some things so you can say "yes" to the things that will build a relationship with the person you want to know. It is the same in nourishing a relationship with God. There must be times when we choose to be with God, over other pursuits.

How does a person spend time with God? It's not like going over to your neighbor's house, knocking on the door and sharing a cup of coffee together. God is invisible and rarely speaks with an audible voice. You can't shake God's hand. This makes relationship building with God obviously something that one must think about carefully. It's not like a casual contact. How then shall we overcome these obstacles?

The Scriptures give us several leads. The first lead is obviously faith. You gain an audience with God by believing that God is there, even if not visible, and by talking to and listening for God, intuitively. "Faith is being sure of what

we hope for," we read in Hebrews II:I (NIV), "and certain of what we do not see." The invisibility of God does not have to be a



barrier to relationship with the Lord, if we're inclined toward faith, toward trusting "what we do not see."

A second lead in nourishing a relationship with God is the willingness to spend time in silence. The psalmist reported God's command, "Be still and know that I am God," (Psalm 46:10a). If God likes to speak through silence, then shouldn't we seek to find time for it in our daily lives? Yes, we certainly should! We should seek time daily, for periods of silence and solitude, when we can unwind, calm down, let the distractions slip from our mind; release our worries and our regrets, and seek to rest in the lap of the Lord!

Some may be quick to say, "When do I have time for that?" If that's what you, or I, would say, then perhaps, we need to think about the pace of life we've let ourselves fall into. In Proverbs we read, "My son, pay attention to what I say; listen closely to my words. Do not let them slip out of sight" (Proverbs 4:20 -21). In our admittedly busy and hectic world, that is counsel to heed, if we want to attend to our relationship with God.

Think about it!

People often ask, "What has God done for me?" Without God, "we are books without words or paths without directions."

God takes care of us even when we have no clue what we need.

All we have to do is accept His love and show it by the way we talk and live. Go ahead and unexpectedly hold a door for someone, or feel free to sprinkle some salt on the icy driveway of Agape or shovel a path for your neighbor. Or maybe send a card to someone who needs your prayers. Isn't it amazing how coffee and donuts and cookies magically show up on Sunday mornings or how the fresh veggies appeared this summer to be shared with the city folk by the generous country folk? Be sure and keep an eye on the Agape Youth as they volunteer their time and efforts to help others, while modeling that positive behavior as the younger kids watch that happen. Keep the faith, count your blessings, and carry on! Remember, "When prayers go up, blessings come down!"
